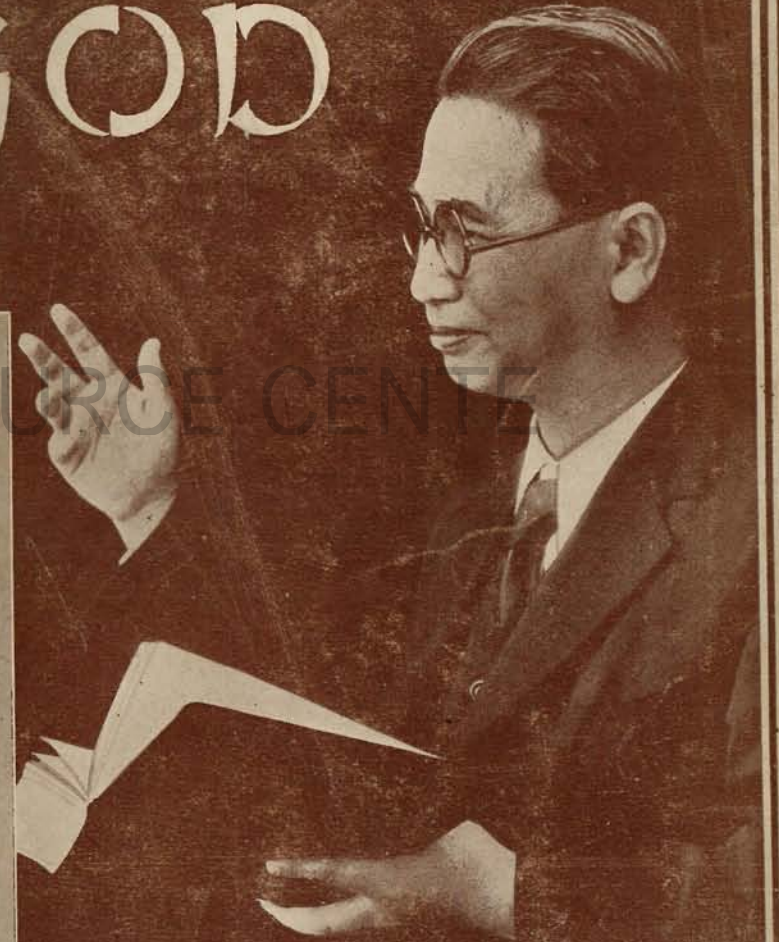

## INTRODUCTION

**T**HIS book is selling today in Japan by the hundred thousand. Simple as it is in its expression of the Christian fundamentals, it is very timely. "New life, new morale, a new society—through God:" these are its essence. Japan is seeking new life, and she listens eagerly to one who is already a national hero, telling of the things by which he lives. Champion of the poor, Mr. Toyohiko Kagawa has become expert adviser to the Government: mystic and social reformer, he is doing more than any one else for social reconstruction: poet and preacher, he gathers great crowds whenever he speaks.

These chapters, taken down by friends as he spoke them to such mass-meetings, remind one of the sermons of Frederick Robertson, of Brighton, in their vivid directness and in their ring of conviction. They reveal him, too, as a close student of our times, with an earnest mind seeking to understand the world in which he lives, and seeing in the needs of his people a challenge to creative leadership. At immense sacrifice of health and wealth and leisure, he has lived out the message which is here embodied, and others besides his own people will be glad to be reminded what are the springs of victorious and creative living for us all, and to see the soul of the new Orient revealed.
