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INTRODUCTION

THIS book is selling today in Japan by the hundred thousand. Simple as it is in its expression of the Christian fundamentals, it is very timely. "New life, new morale, a new society—through God:" these are its essence. Japan is seeking new life, and she listens eagerly to one who is already a national hero, telling of the things by which he lives. Champion of the poor, Mr. Toyohiko Kagawa has become expert adviser to the Government: mystic and social reformer, he is doing more than any one else for social reconstruction: poet and preacher, he gathers great crowds whenever he speaks.
